We are very excited to report that we have a most generous benefactor who has offered to purchase a van for our community

center in Ethiopia. Our new diesel van/ambulance, will hold 9 passengers and can be used to transport our elderly guests. Amsalu Gelata, our trustee, who is originally from Ethiopia, is arranging the purchase and shipping in Amsterdam, Holland and Terfa Dinka, our manager in Ethiopia, is arranging the importation license and the rail transportation from the port in Dijbouti to Ethiopia.

THE \$30 MIRACLE

Mfin is a 64 year-old woman who, in her poverty and old age, has been struck with a double tragedy. She has lost her only son and his wife due to HIV/AIDS and as a result she became the custodian of her four orphan grandchildren. She rapidly became blind due to cataracts, which meant that she could not even see the precious children she cared for so lovingly. It's hard to comprehend the devastation of her being dependent on these little children. They had to take her hand and lead her through the bush to the well and to the toilet. They had to take turns going to school because someone had to be with their grandmother. Imagine her joy when after her first eye was operated on, and the cataract removed, she could again see her little grandchildren. Soon afterwards, her second eye was operated on and now she is fully sighted. We are told that there wasn't a dry eye in the clinic when she, crying with joy, kissed the faces of her grandchildren and the hands of the surgeon. This miracle cost \$30.

Each month, we pay for cataract operations for four (4) aged blind people. With your continued help, we intend to be able to restore sight to ten (10) aged people a month. Please help us reach our goal.



We would like to take the opportunity to welcome to our community the students of Good Counsel High School, Olney, MD. During the coming year, these students will complete their required community service by their involvement in many of our programs and projects. We look forward to their young perspectives, enthusiasm, and creativity. We are very excited by this new collaborative effort.







We recently received a letter from Ben Ssennoga at Michael's House in Kampala, Uganda and some photos from our farms in Uganda showing both the livestock grazing and the crops. Upcoming plans include additional clearing for planting new crops, more fencing for grazing our animals, and construction of houses for the elderly who are homeless.

One of our trustees, who is an architect, is currently drawing the plans to build small houses in a village format on the farms outside of Kampala. They are almost ready for production. The residents will be the homeless elderly men and women who will have access to planting their own vegetables and rear small animals for meat and milk. While the farms are remote from the city of Kampala, the residents will be self-sufficient and have supervision. It is hoped that the residents will be able to exchange produce and supplies with one another and to provide for those who might eventually be incapable of contributing to the manual labor. The farms are in jungle areas and need constant work.

Currently, the produce from the farms is being distributed to the elderly in their homes. This includes beans, sweet potatoes, cassava and some mattock (banana). Recently the volunteers have started delivering eggs to provide more protein. With the severe increase in prices, the supplemental pensions we provide allow the elderly to buy sugar, salt, soap, maize, flour and personal needs for hygiene.

For generations, millions of women have suffered a preventable and overwhelming tragedy that has not only medical but terrible psychosocial repercussions. Through obstructed or prolonged labor they are damaged to the extent that they suffer from a fistula. Although the medical reasons are complex, it is sufficient to say that they are left incontinent of bowel and bladder. The psychosocial complications are devastating. They begin with social isolation due to offensive odor, and many women are abandoned, divorced, and ostracized. Each month we provide the finances for surgery to liberate women from this stigma. For \$90 US you can restore dignity to a woman.
